	Southwark's Bereavement Service provides for burial and cremation within the borough. However, as is the case with other London Boroughs, supply of burial space is becoming

Works at Area D1 are therefore proposed as part of the short - term delivery of that Strategy. By widening the glade area marginally and providing an access path up the slope a number of plots would be made possible contributing to a supply of much needed burial space whilst at the same time providing better public access.

The Council are fully aware of the nature conservation, heritage and arboricultural values of the site and of the wider cemetery. The future of the site and the cemetery as a whole has been the subject of a prolonged engagement process involving the establishment of a stakeholder group with representatives including the London Wildlife Trust. The proposals have been subject to numerous iterations in response to this engagement process and consultations with council officers and third parties (to the extent that the total number of plots has been reduced from 220 or so initially envisaged within the Strategy to the more modest number of 145 now proposed). The current proposal have thus been developed with a view to ensuring that, as far as practically possible, this modest expansion of burial capacity is balanced with the protection and where possible enhancement of the nature conservation, heritage, arboricultural and amenity value of the site.

Essentially the principle of use of the area for burial is already established and the application relates primarily to the requirement for the provision of the new footpath and associated works.

### Specification and Description of Works

A detailed description of the site, and the proposed works is included within the DRAFT Planning Submission: Design and Appearance and Access Statement submitted with this document.

In summary the development includes

- loss of 23 trees (of which 1 is large: a poplar) with in excess of 25+ heavy standard trees and numerous smaller feathered trees of native varieties re-planted
- retention and protection of a buffer including along the One Tree Hill Nature reserve boundary in the west
- the burial area extended with species rich meadow grass by approximately 500sq.m into the woodland margins with 300sq.m of new woodland/woodland edge planting re-planted by way of mitigation
- a new narrow path extending up the slope to enable access and leading to two small seating areas
- one of which would be a memorial feature incorporating a bench commemorating those buried within public graves in this part of the Cemetery
- extensive areas of wildflower meadow established on the public burial areas
- nature conservation measures including bat and bird boxes, hibernaculum, log piles and stacks
- with the total burial area within D1 area at completion (excluding new planting/woodland planting, wildflower verges and new paths) being approximately 710 sq.m (less than 0.5% of entire cemetery)

Protection of graves, remains and memorials:

- part of the site (where the footpath, memorial seating and wildflower meadow is proposed) is underlain by public graves generally pre 1970 but with some later.
   Whilst many graves here have no memorials a number of them do – albeit with no specific memorial rights appertaining to them.
- Where memorials to public graves are required to be moved to enable the footpath alignment and meadow they will be removed and stored for a minimum of 6 months subject to notification procedures modelled around process in LACO.
- It is not intended to disturb any human remains as part of the works
- Existing private burial areas (with memorials) adjacent to the site will be protected and retained unaffected.

#### Management

Long term management will be the subject of the *Camberwell New Cemetery Conservation Management Plan* – (currently in draft form and being developed).

The Cemetery is a Site of Importance for Nature Conservation (SINC). In the interests of maintaining and enhancing the nature conservation status of the site the detailed management of native tree and shrub planting and wildflower areas, and other nature conservation measures is anticipated to be the subject of on-going discussion and refinement with key stakeholders including the London Wildlife Trust.

In the interests of ensuring all new memorials are in keeping with the setting and in order to maintain attractive views out and across the site it is the intention to introduce new memorial regulations. These will be based around the Diocesan Churchyard Regulations and restricted to monuments in natural stone with low lustre finishes and with a limited range of hues and colours (not black granite). It is anticipated that only low level plaque memorials will be permitted. The regulations are currently the subject of discussion with stakeholders and are anticipated as being submitted in draft form to the Diocese prior to Faculty approval.

#### Information

Planning application for the works is due to be submitted imminently. The Councils planning department is being kept fully informed of the proposals.

All necessary work to conduct additional bat surveys, fell trees and erect alternative roost sites will be undertaken strictly in accordance with current legislation and licencing conditions in respect of bats. Similarly all felling/clearance will be carried out in compliance with the Wildlife and Countryside Act and mindful of the recognised bird nesting season.
